

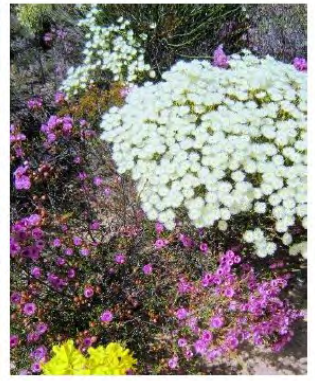

2019 / 2020 Budget Special

At a Meeting held on Tuesday 20 August 2019, Council adopted the 2019-2020 Annual Budget

The budget was prepared with an opening balance of \$1,727,085 mostly due to advanced payment of Federal Assistance Grants, net savings in the capital program and additional savings in operations. Approximately 30% of the revenue is derived from rates with a further 17% from operating grants and the remainder from fees and charges, interest earned on investments and other revenue.

The Shire of Corrigin budget includes capital grants of \$3.6 million with the majority of this funding coming from the Department of Regional Development Commodity Freight Route and Federal Blackspot road funding programs. Income from other State and Federal Departments make up the remainder of revenue sources.

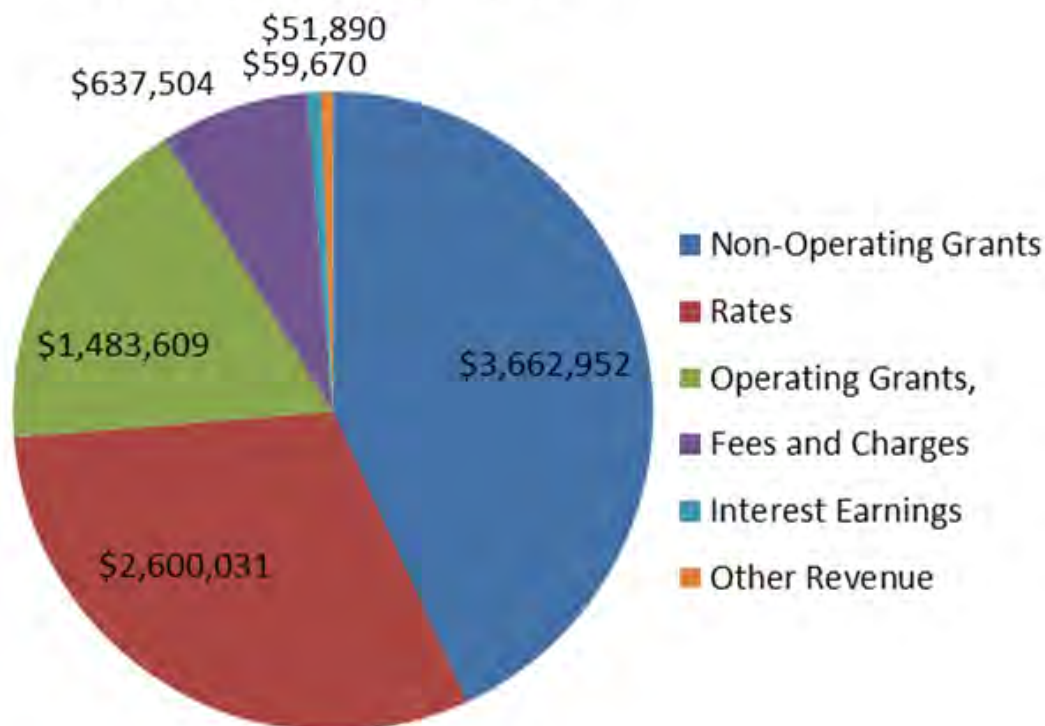
The 2019-2020 budget has been prepared based on a 2% increase in the rate income for both rural and town properties.

HOW RATES ARE CALCULATED?

Rates are calculated based on the rateable properties within the Shire and are valued by the Government Valuer (Landgate) using two methods: Unimproved Valuation (UV) for rural properties and Gross Rental Value (GRV) for town properties. Landgate undertake a valuation of UV rated properties on an annual basis and GRV rated properties are valued every three to five years. GRV revaluation has recently occurred and applies to properties from 1 July 2019. The overall increase in property valuations for the 2019 year was 8.88% for UV properties whereas the GRV property valuations decreased by 9.86%.

The valuation is then multiplied by the rate in the dollar set by Council which can vary from year to year depending on the total amount of rates to be raised. If the total calculation is less than Council's minimum rate, the minimum rate applies.

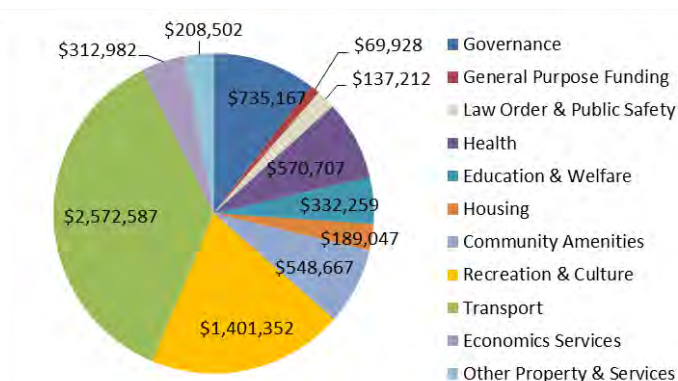
HOW IS THE MONEY SPENT?

OPERATING EXPENDITURE

The cost of providing these services for 2019-2020 is approximately \$7 million. The following chart provides an indication of where funds will be spent in 2019-2020.

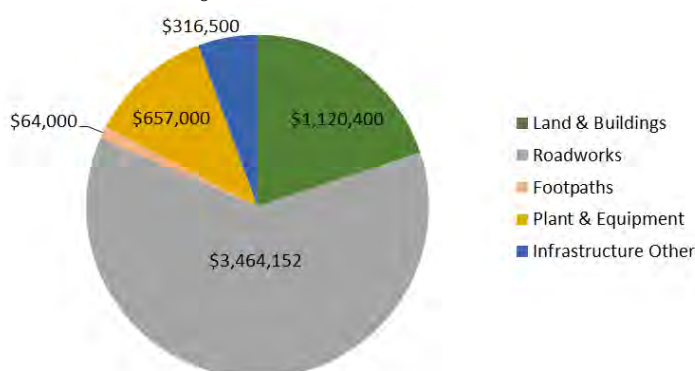


CAPITAL INVESTMENT

Capital works planned for 2019-2020 total \$5,622,051 and will be funded by general revenue as well as State and Federal grants and contributions.

Expenditure on roads and footpaths is a major component of this year's budget amounting to \$3.5m. Council has also budgeted for a large number of improvements to community assets to ensure the continual upgrade and asset preservation.

The following chart provides an indication of the capital investment included in the budget.



CAPITAL INVESTMENT - General

In addition to Council's focus on improving roads, the following capital expenditure has been budgeted in 2019-2020.

HOW TO PAY RATES

Payments can be made in person at the Shire of Corrigin office at 9 Lynch Street, by cheque, cash, credit card, EFT or Bpoint and must be received by 4.30pm on Thursday 3 October to be eligible for a discount. Please allow time for postage and clearing of funds if paying by cheque and bank processing times if paying by EFT or Bpoint to allow payment to be received by the Shire on or before the due date. Shire staff are not able to grant a discount if payment is not received and processed by the due date.

RATES PAYMENTS

The Shire provides two options for payment of your rates:

[Option 1](#) - Payment in Full, less any entitled discount.

[Option 2](#) - Payment in four instalments:

- 1st Instalment due date: 3 October 2019
- 2nd Instalment due date: 3 December 2019
- 3rd Instalment due date: 3 February 2020
- 4th Instalment due date: 3 April 2020

Payment of rates via Option 2 will result in the following:

Administration charge—\$10 per instalment

Instalment interest—5.5% per annum

Council Election Nominations

Local government councillors make many important decisions about the future of your community and we need to have a range of views represented on Council. You can get involved and contribute to the future of your shire by nominating for Council and making decisions about the services to the community such as: recreation buildings; parks and ovals; roads and footpaths; local planning and development and waste management.

Local government ordinary elections are held every two years and the next election will be held on Saturday 19th October 2019. Councillors are elected for four year terms, with half of the Councillors' terms concluding at each biennial election.

The Shire of Corrigin has seven Councillors and there are three vacancies in 2019. Meetings are currently held on the third Tuesday of the month at 3pm but the meeting date and time can be changed to suit the majority of Councillors. If you are thinking of becoming a councillor it is important that you are aware of your obligations and commitments if you are elected.

INTERESTED IN BECOMING A COUNCILLOR?

To be eligible to nominate as a candidate you must be an elector of the district (residential or owner/ occupier) and over 18 years of age.

NOMINATIONS OPEN Thursday 5th September and close at 4.00pm on 12th September 2019.

This year it is compulsory for all candidates to complete an online induction prepared by the Department of Local Government. You will need to declare that you have completed the online induction when you complete your nomination form. It is an offence to make false or misleading statements on the nomination form.

To nominate as a candidate in the local government election you will need to:

- Complete the online Induction
- Complete and submit a nomination form;
- Supply a candidate profile (150 words maximum);
- Pay a deposit of \$80; and
- Include a recent passport size photograph (optional).

All nomination applications must be signed by the candidate in front of a witness and presented to Natalie Manton, **Returning Officer before 4.00pm on the 12th September 2019. It is recommended that you don't leave it until the last minute in case any changes are required prior to the close of nominations.**

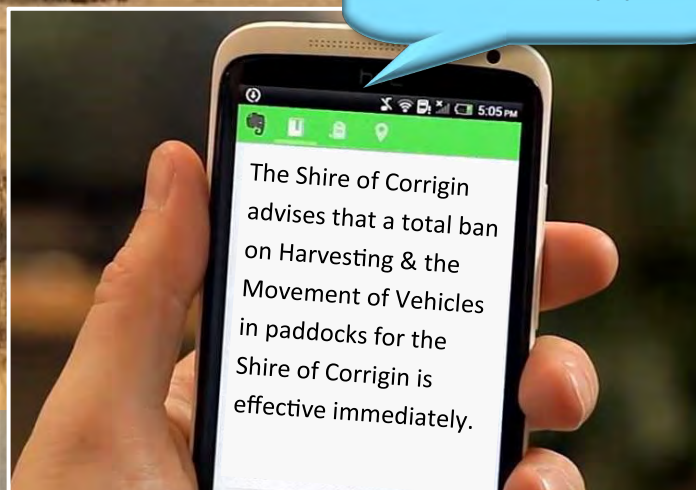

Shire of Corrigin Firebreak Order 2019/2020

Pursuant to the powers contained in Section 33 of the *Bush Fires Act 1954*, you are hereby required to install firebreaks clear of all flammable material or take alternative approved measures, and to undertake fuel hazard reduction measures before 31 October 2019 and thereafter maintain free of all inflammable material until 15 April 2020.

1. RURAL LAND

1.1 *Mineral earth firebreaks* of not less than 2.44 metres (8 feet) in width must be constructed along and within 20 metres of all external boundaries of the property owned or occupied by you. If any portion of the land adjoins a public road or railway line, a firebreak must also be constructed along that boundary.

1.2 Property in excess of 250 hectares shall have *mineral earth firebreaks* positioned as necessary to divide land into areas not exceeding 250 hectares each completely surrounded by a *mineral earth firebreak*.

1.3 Clear and maintain *mineral earth firebreaks* at least 2.44 metres (8 feet) wide within 20 metres of the perimeter of any building or group of buildings, fuel tanks, hayshed or haystack, in such a manner as to fully encircle the structure/s. In addition to *mineral earth firebreaks*, a 20 metre wide low fuel zone is required to be maintained around any building or group of buildings, fuel tanks, hayshed or haystack. Low fuel means the removal of inflammable material, dead trees, leaf litter and trash and the removal of dead branches to a height of 1.5 metres from live standing trees. Grass is to be slashed to a height not exceeding 100mm.

1.4 During any period when harvesting operations are being conducted, there shall be provided an operational mobile firefighting unit with a minimum capacity of 500 litres of water located in or immediately adjacent to the paddock being harvested. The responsibility to supply the unit is that of the landowner/occupier.

2. TOWN SITES

2.1 Where the area of the land is 0.2 hectares (one half of one acre) or less, you shall clear all inflammable material on the land from the whole of the land.

2.2 Where the area of the land exceeds 0.2 hectares (one half of one acre), you shall clear of all inflammable material, *mineral earth firebreaks* not less than 2.44 metres (8 feet) wide immediately inside all external boundaries of the land, and also immediately surrounding all buildings, haystacks and fuel ramps situated on the land, and also immediately surrounding any drums or drums situated on the land which are normally used for the storage of fuel, whether they contain fuel or not.

3. GENERAL PROVISIONS

The term **"inflammable Material"** or the purpose of this notice includes bush (as defined in the Bush Fires Act 1954), timber, boxes, cartons, paper, and the like inflammable materials, rubbish and any combustible matter, but does not include buildings, green standing trees and bushes or growing bushes or plants in gardens or lawns. If it is considered to be impractical for any reason to provide *mineral earth firebreaks* in the position or adhere to the provisions required by this notice, the written approval of Council or a duly authorised officer must be obtained to prepare such *mineral earth firebreaks* in an alternative position. If permission is not granted by Council or a duly authorised officer you shall comply with the requirements of this order.

The term **"mineral earth firebreak"** means an area of the owner(s)/occupiers(s) land, cleared and maintained totally clear of all vegetation material (living or dead) so there is only mineral earth left.

The term **"harvesting/total movement ban"** includes harvesting and the movement of vehicles in paddocks, except vehicles carrying water to stock.

Contractors carting lime, gypsum or fertilizer are allowed to enter into paddocks to **unload at any time that there is a "harvest/total movement ban"** in place on the condition that a manned fire unit with at least 500 litres of water is in attendance.

4. HARVEST / MOVEMENT OF VEHICLES BANS

TOTAL FIRE BANS may be imposed by DFES on a regional basis on days of severe or greater fire danger. Activities which may cause a fire are prohibited. Harvesting/movement bans may also be imposed by the Shire. Harvesting is not **permitted on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day.**

5. ADDITIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES AND PENALTIES

The penalty for failing to comply with this order is a fine of not more than five thousand dollars (\$5000) and a person in default is also liable, whether prosecuted or not, to pay the cost of performing the work directed by this notice, if it is not carried out by the owner or occupier by the date required by this notice. In addition, Council can arrange for the required work to be carried out at the cost of the owner or occupier. Gas or electric barbecues ONLY are permitted during prohibited burning periods. No solid fuel or wood barbecues allowed. Camping and Cooking fires are prohibited during the prohibited and restricted burning periods unless a valid permit has been issued by the Chief Bush Fire Control Officer.

Permits for burning during the restricted burning period are available from your local Bush Fire Control Officer. Burning is not permitted during the restricted burning period and public holidays or during Easter when Easter falls within the restricted burning period. Persons burning without permits during the restricted burning period or on days when a very high or greater fire weather warning has been issued may be prosecuted. Prior to any burning, you are required to notify your neighbours, Bush Fire Control Officer and the Shire of Corrigin. Besides being responsible for the safety of your own property, if a fire escapes from your property you may be liable to pay compensation for any damage caused outside of your property. Public infrastructure must not be placed in a manner that results in an above-ground encroachment into the firebreak area. Trees must not be planted in a manner that results in vegetation encroaching into the firebreak area.

6. BURNING PERIODS

RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD - Permit to burn required from a Bush Fire Control Officer from 19 September 2019 to 31 October 2019 and from 16 February 2020 to 15 April 2020.

NO BURNING PERMITTED (INCLUDING CAMP FIRES) - From 1 November 2019 to 15 February 2020.

7. BUSH FIRE CONTROL OFFICERS

Shire of Corrigin Bush Fire Control Officers are authorised to issue permits to burn on private land during the restricted burning period. Bush Fire Control Officers are also empowered to enter land and issue directives relating to fire suppression and control.

Local Heritage Survey

The Shire of Corrigin has reviewed the list of heritage places in our district and seeks public feedback and comment on the draft Local Heritage Survey (formerly Municipal Heritage Inventory).



The Local Heritage Survey lists and describes buildings and places that have played an important role in our history and/or are special because of their architectural style or association with an individual or the community.

The review process commenced in 2017 was undertaken in line with the requirements of the Heritage Act 2018. The review involved updating and providing additional information on the 197 places and sites included in the existing 1996 Heritage Survey.

In addition to the information in the Local Heritage Survey, a set of Development Guidelines has been developed for the Main Street Precinct to ensure a balance is maintained between the development of future buildings and conservation of the existing heritage values.

The draft Local Heritage Survey is now available for public comment and can be viewed at the Shire of Corrigin Administration Office 9 Lynch Street Corrigin between 8.30am to 4.30pm Monday - Friday or at www.corrigin.wa.gov.au/news/local-heritage-survey/1235

Submissions are welcome up until 6 September 2019 and can be sent to eso@corrigin.wa.gov.au, a public meeting will be held on 5 September at the Shire Office.

2019-2020 BLACK SPOT PROGRAM FUNDING FOR CORRIGIN

O'Connor will receive more than \$1 million in Federal Government funding for vital upgrades to improve the safety of local roads under the Government's Black Spot Program, which includes upgrades to sections of Corrigin-Quairading Road in the Shire of Corrigin.

Containers for Change

Western Australia's new container deposit scheme (the Scheme) will start on Tuesday 2 June 2020.

Corrigin residents will be able to return and recycle their eligible containers at a local 'Containers for Change' refund point to receive a 10¢ refund per container. More than 170 full-time or flexible refund points will be open for business, with 229 refund points to open by the end of the scheme's first year. An array of refund points will be available - from over-the-counter depots providing on-the-spot refunds, to 'Bag Drops' that provide the convenience of a 'drop and go' facility with refunds deposited into customers' nominated bank accounts once their containers are counted. Mobile refund points and reverse vending machines will also be in operation. 'Containers for Change' will be run by the not-for-profit 'WA Return Recycle Renew Ltd' (WARRRL) group that has been appointed by the State Government. WARRRL will be the driving force behind changing consumer behaviours when it comes to recycling beverage containers. Beverage containers currently account for 44 per cent of all litter by volume in WA.

Over the next 20 years, WA will see an estimated 706 million fewer beverage containers being littered, 6.6 billion fewer beverage containers going to landfill; and 5.9 billion more containers being recycled.

'Containers for Change' will also help create 500 jobs across WA, with a key objective of the Scheme to support employment of people with disability and the long-term unemployed.

So GET INVOLVED!

An important part of the Scheme is the establishment and operation of Refund Points across the State, to accept the return of eligible beverage containers and facilitate customer refunds of 10¢ per eligible container.

WARRRL is inviting interested community groups, charities, social enterprises, service organisations and businesses to apply to become a Refund Point (or register as a Donation Point eg community groups), a role that includes:

- Collecting eligible containers deposited by members of the public and charity organisations.
- Counting and sorting of the returned containers.
- Facilitate customer refunds of 10¢ per eligible container returned (refund not applicable if a Donation Point).
- Connecting with the community to ensure awareness and understanding of the Scheme.
